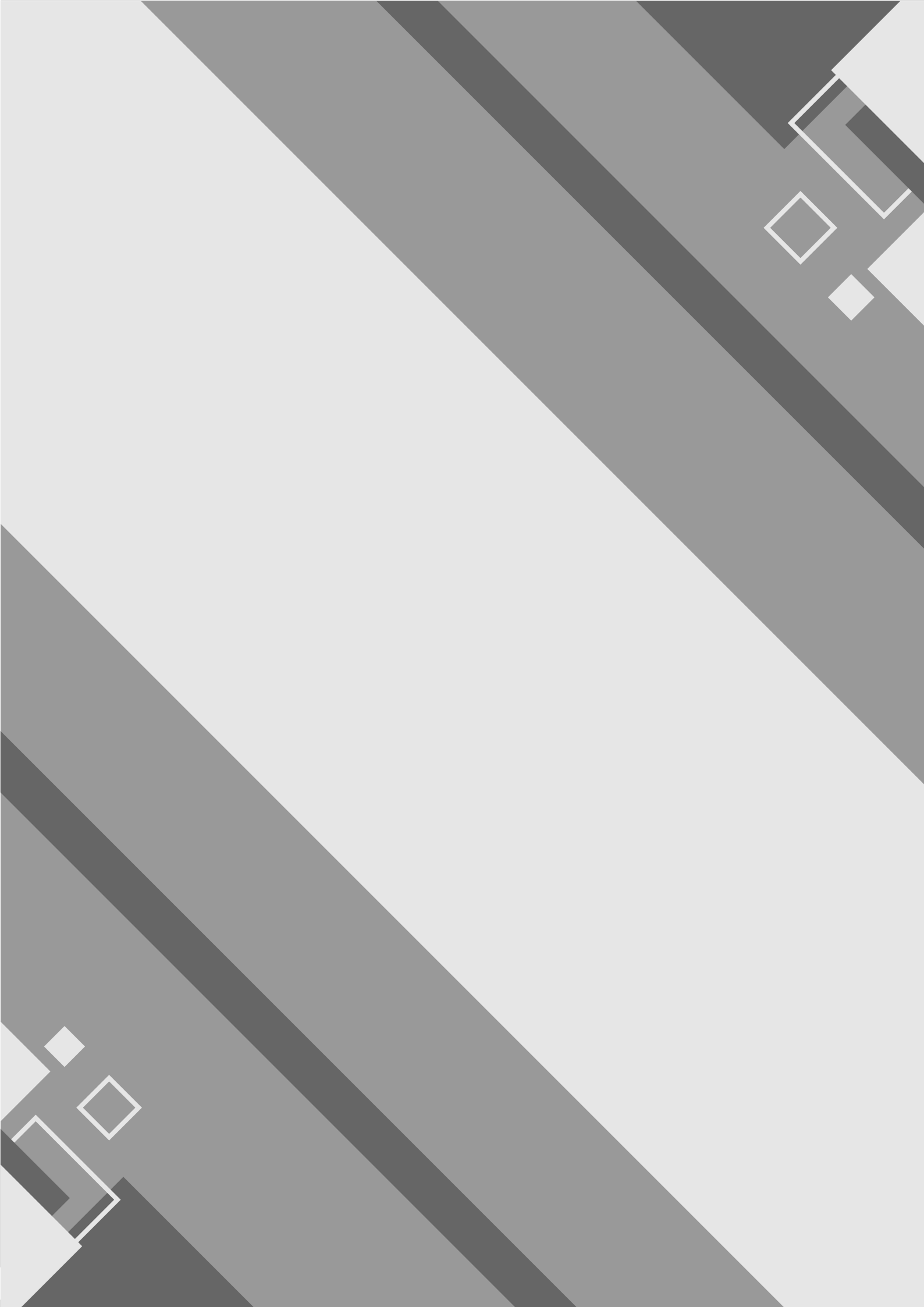


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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Amuvi Development Group Management Team (ADGMT), also known as the Amuvi Development Group (ADG), continued to make significant strides in community development during the 2025 reporting period through the collective efforts of its seven working committees. Guided by its vision of sustainable growth and community empowerment, ADG implemented strategic initiatives in agriculture, education and training, electricity, finance, healthcare, water infrastructure, and urban development, all aimed at improving the socio-economic wellbeing of Amuvi people.

The Agriculture & Food Security Committee strengthened its operations through expanded membership participation and continued advocacy on food security and household farming. A major highlight of the year was the successful Agric Empowerment Seminar, which provided practical agricultural training and knowledge-sharing opportunities for community members. The committee also distributed over 250 seedlings and nursery plants to support household farming initiatives and internally mobilized approximately ₦1.1 million to fund its activities. Collaborative discussions with the Urban Development Committee also advanced plans for a community-wide tree-planting initiative scheduled for implementation in 2026.

The Education and Training Committee sustained its focus on youth empowerment, entrepreneurship, and human capital development. Key activities included apprenticeship assessments, trainee empowerment initiatives, beneficiary follow-up evaluations, and the strengthening of partnerships aimed at expanding digital and technical training opportunities. The Committee initiated collaboration with the Initiative for Digital Inclusion (IDI) and Alpha Plus Group toward the establishment of a Community Self-Built Sustainable Connectivity Hub and a Sustainable Digital and Technical Skills Pathway initiative. When fully operational, it is envisaged that several beneficiaries of the program would be self-employed, gainfully employed, or successfully operating small businesses using the skills acquired through the initiative.

The Electricity Committee made measurable progress in improving electricity infrastructure and distribution within Amuvi. Major achievements included the successful installation and commissioning of a new 500KVA transformer at Iyiocha, rehabilitation of feeder pillars, maintenance of substations and distribution lines, and ongoing collaboration with the Enugu Electricity Distribution Company (EEDC) to address transformer and connectivity challenges. Despite persistent issues relating to aging infrastructure, faulty transformers, and funding constraints, the Committee continued to improve power supply reliability across parts of the community.

The Finance Committee focused on developing innovative strategies to secure external funding for community development initiatives. A key accomplishment during the year was the successful initiation and development of the official AWADA website. The website is designed to strengthen community engagement, improve information sharing, and enhance the visibility of ADG and its projects. Over time, it is expected to become a vital tool for expanding outreach, attracting donors and development partners, and mobilizing resources to support sustainable community development.

The Health Committee recorded remarkable progress in strengthening healthcare delivery services in Amuvi and surrounding communities. Key milestones included the commissioning of a solar-powered clinic, establishment of fully functional eye and dental clinics, expansion of medical outreach programs, and improved access to affordable healthcare services. Increased patient attendance, infrastructure upgrades, and stronger collaboration with the Abia State Government contributed significantly to improved service delivery and renewed public confidence in the healthcare system.

The Water Committee focused primarily on advancing the design and planning of a comprehensive water reticulation system intended to provide household water distribution throughout Amuvi. During the year, the Committee completed the mapping and validation of reticulation lines and developed a draft implementation template for the project. The Committee also supervised critical maintenance activities, including borehole refurbishment, leak repairs, facility upgrades, and security improvements at the water facility. However, inadequate funding remained a major challenge, with many activities supported through personal contributions by committee members.

The Urban Development Committee (AUDC) continued to provide strategic oversight and coordination for sustainable physical and infrastructural development within Amuvi. Key activities included oversight of road construction projects, site suitability assessments for proposed community projects, stakeholder sensitization campaigns, and collaborative engagements with other ADG committees. A major highlight of the year was the continued advancement of the Digital Masterplan initiative for Amuvi. The Committee conducted stakeholder presentations, published awareness materials on development regulations, and successfully mobilized approximately ₦3.6 million in support of the project.

Overall, the 2025 reporting year reflected meaningful progress across all sectors despite ongoing challenges relating to funding, infrastructure limitations, and operational capacity. Through collaboration, volunteerism, and strategic partnerships, ADG and its committees continued to lay a strong foundation for sustainable development, improved public services, economic empowerment, and modernization of Amuvi community. Looking ahead, ADG remains committed to expanding its development initiatives, strengthening institutional partnerships, and pursuing long-term projects that will further enhance the welfare and future prosperity of Amuvi people.

MAIN REPORTS

INTRODUCTION

The (ADGMT) also known as (ADG) was established in 2020 to lead, coordinate, and implement the long-term development initiatives of AWADA for the advancement of Amuvi community. The organization is made up of Amuvi indigenes both in Nigeria and in the Diaspora, bringing together individuals from diverse professional backgrounds who are united by a common vision of sustainable community development.

Since its inception, ADG has undertaken and supported several impactful developmental projects through its seven (7) working committees, namely Agriculture, Education, Electricity, Finance, Health, Water, Urban Development, and other community-focused initiatives. These committees continue to serve as the driving force behind the planning and execution of programs aimed at improving the welfare and infrastructure of Amuvi, Arochukwu.

One of the key mandates of ADG is to maintain transparency, accountability, and effective communication with members and stakeholders through the publication of annual progress reports. To date, ADG has successfully published three (3) annual reports, and this document represents the fourth edition.

This report provides a comprehensive overview of the activities, achievements, challenges, and future plans of seven (7) working committees during the reporting year. It highlights the collective efforts, dedication, and contributions of members toward the continued growth and development of Amuvi community.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Agriculture & Food Security Committee

Overview:

The Food & Security Committee remains committed to enhancing agricultural productivity and strengthening the economic resilience of the Amuvi community. Our core mandate is to empower residents through modern farming techniques, effective resource distribution, and strategic planning aimed at achieving food sovereignty. In 2025, we experienced a significant expansion within the committee, welcoming new members whose inclusion has strengthened our operational capacity and broadened representation across the village. **The committee is made up of the following members: Mazi (Dr) Henry Onyeador (Chairman), Mazi Ikechukwu Okafor (Co-Chair), Mazi Engr. Ogbonnia Nwafor (PG), Mazi Emeka Orji, Rev Chima Okoro and Mazi Engr. Onyeka Uwah.**

Activities & Achievements

Throughout the year, the committee engaged in regular strategic discussions centered on community empowerment and sustainable agricultural development. One of our flagship initiatives was the Agric Empowerment Seminar held in August 2025. This event was specifically designed to provide practical agricultural education to Amuvi residents, featuring expert facilitators who conducted hands-on planting sessions.

In addition to this, we implemented a strong advocacy and publicity campaign. Through consistent daily social media engagement and the use of physical banners within the community, we were able to raise awareness and sensitize residents on the importance of food security.

We also prioritized collaboration by working closely with the Urban Development Committee. Together, we developed plans for a community-wide tree-planting initiative, ensuring that agricultural advancement aligns with the overall aesthetics and environmental sustainability of the village.

I am pleased to report that the committee recorded several notable achievements during the year. We successfully mobilized ₦1.1 million through internal contributions from committee members, which fully funded our empowerment programs. In promoting household farming, we distributed 250 nursery plants to residents, encouraging immediate cultivation efforts.

Furthermore, we hosted two professional resource persons who provided valuable hands-on training, significantly contributing to capacity building within the community. The August seminar also recorded high participation levels, supported by a welcoming atmosphere and the provision of refreshments, which enhanced community engagement and goodwill.

Challenges:

Despite these successes, we encountered some challenges that provide valuable lessons for improvement. We observed that participation was largely dominated by the elderly, highlighting the need to attract more youth and active farmers. Scheduling conflicts with market days, particularly Ahia Nworie, as well as funeral activities, also affected attendance. Additionally, external noise at the venue and a greater interest in free seedlings rather than the educational content somewhat limited the overall impact of the training sessions.

Looking ahead to 2026, the committee has outlined clear and strategic goals. We plan to launch "Operation No Fallow Ground," a home gardening initiative aimed at ensuring every household actively utilizes available land for food production. We also intend to establish crop-specific cooperatives supported by demonstration farms and technical training to further strengthen agricultural output. The community tree-planting initiative, which was postponed, has now been rescheduled for the 2026 planting season in collaboration with the Urban Development Committee. Finally, we will intensify our efforts to mobilize the youth by strengthening partnerships with youth leadership and Onyemarawanneya, ensuring that the next generation plays a leading role in Amuvi's agricultural transformation.

In conclusion, the year 2025 was one of growth, impact, and valuable learning for the Agriculture and Food Security Committee. We remain committed to building on this progress as we work collectively toward a more food-secure and economically resilient Amuvi community.

Education and Training Committee

1.0 Overview

The Education and Training Committee of the Amuvi Development Group (ADG) was inaugurated in August 2020 in response to the socio-economic disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, particularly its adverse effects on youth livelihoods and community stability. The Committee was established as a strategic platform to advance human capital development in Amuvi through structured education, vocational training, entrepreneurship, and empowerment initiatives. **They are made up of the following members: Mazi (Dr.) Chibueze Tobias Orji (Chairman), Adamazi (Dr.) Ijeoma Okoronkwo (Co-Chair).**

The Committee operates within the broader vision of ADG to promote sustainable community development by equipping individuals with relevant competencies, ethical values, and support systems necessary for productive engagement, self-reliance, and community transformation.

Below are the mandate and Objectives of the committee:

The Education and Training Committee is mandated to:

1. Design and implement integrated programs that combine value reorientation, vocational training, apprenticeship, empowerment, and monitoring.
2. Coordinate skills acquisition and entrepreneurship initiatives within the community.
3. Facilitate partnerships with relevant institutions and stakeholders to enhance training quality, resource mobilization, and employment opportunities.
4. Oversee the monitoring and evaluation of training outcomes to ensure effectiveness, sustainability, and long-term impact.

The key objectives of the Committee are to:

1. Promote sustainable economic growth and development by creating local platforms that reduce poverty, curb social vices, and improve the quality of life in Amuvi.
2. Empower youths through skills acquisition, entrepreneurship, and innovation, enabling them to attain economic independence and contribute to local enterprise development.
3. Encourage strategic partnerships and resource mobilization that expand employment opportunities and strengthen community resilience.
4. Foster governance, ethical values, accountability, and responsible leadership within the community.

2.0 Activities and Achievements

During the 2025 reporting period, the Committee undertook several strategic and programmatic activities aimed at repositioning its operations toward a more sustainable, technology-driven, and future-oriented framework.

A series of committee meetings were held throughout the year to evaluate previous interventions, review operational challenges, and develop a comprehensive action plan for 2025. These engagements led to the establishment of key milestones designed to transition the Committee's activities from predominantly informal skills training into a more integrated and sustainable education and training ecosystem.

Strategic Partnerships and Program Development - - One of the major initiatives undertaken during the year was the commencement of engagement with the Initiative for Digital Inclusion (IDI) under its Digital Access Program (DAP). This collaboration is focused on the implementation of the Community Self-Built Sustainable Connectivity Hub Project, aimed at expanding digital access, improving community connectivity, and creating an enabling environment for technology-driven learning and entrepreneurship.

In addition, the Committee partnered with Alpha Plus Group to develop a forward-looking training framework titled Sustainable Digital and Technical Skills Pathway. This initiative is designed as a structured capacity-building model integrating digital literacy, technical competencies, and entrepreneurship development.

The proposed Community Self-Built Sustainable Connectivity Hub is expected to serve as a pilot platform for the implementation of this pathway by providing infrastructure and operational support for scalable and impactful training programs.

During the reporting period, the Committee successfully completed critical phases of its training and empowerment cycle, including apprenticeship assessments, trainee empowerment planning, and post-empowerment monitoring and evaluation.

Empowerment and Follow-Up of Beneficiaries

As part of the Education and Training Skills Acquisition Initiative, monitoring and evaluation remain essential and continuous components of the program. In 2025, follow-up assessments were conducted to evaluate the progress and status of beneficiaries. The committee spent Sixty-Five thousand naira (N65,000.00) for empowerment.

The outcomes of these assessments were highly encouraging. Several beneficiaries are now successfully supporting themselves academically and financially through the application of the skills acquired during training. Others have secured employment opportunities with their apprenticeship organizations, while some have established and are independently operating their own businesses.

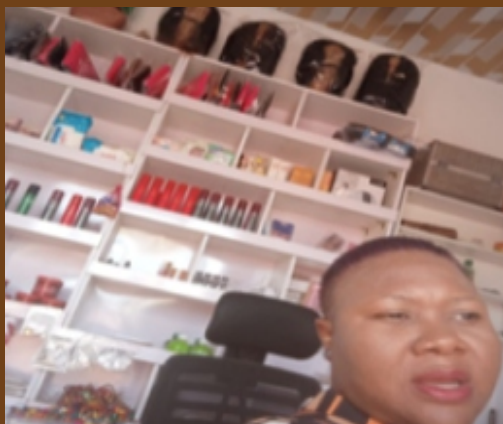

Challenges

Despite the progress recorded, the Committee continues to face significant funding challenges. In particular, the absence of dedicated grants and long-term financial support limits the Committee's ability to redesign and scale the program for broader and more sustainable impact.

Looking ahead, the Committee's priority is to establish a sustainable Skills Acquisition Program anchored at the proposed Amuvi Skills Acquisition Centre within Arochukwu LGA and the wider Senatorial Zone. The Centre is envisioned as a hub for vocational training, mentorship, entrepreneurship development, and innovation.

Additionally, the Committee plans to promote STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) education at Amuvi Comprehensive Secondary School as a complementary strategy for developing foundational competencies and preparing students for emerging technological and vocational opportunities.

This integrated approach is intended to create a structured and self-sustaining system that supports continuous skills development, enhances youth employability, and promotes local enterprise development across the region.

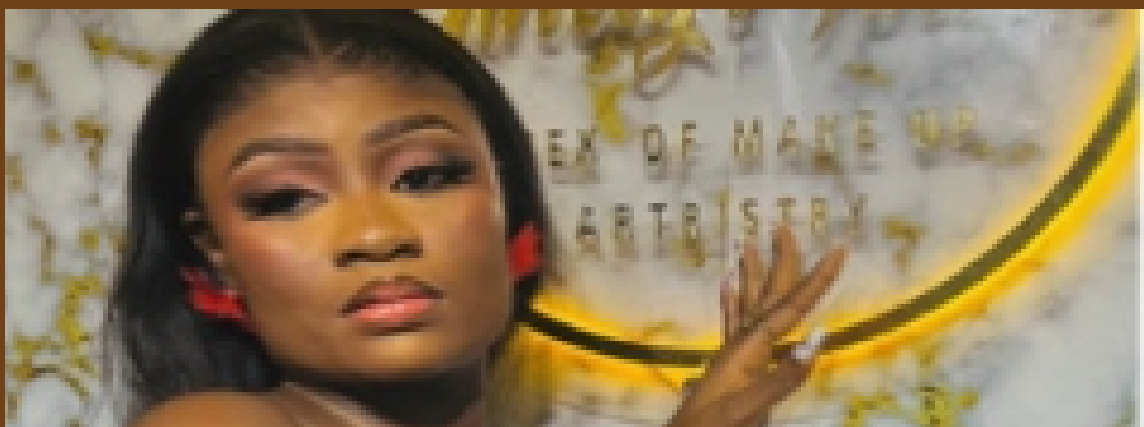
Conclusion

Electricity Committee

Overview

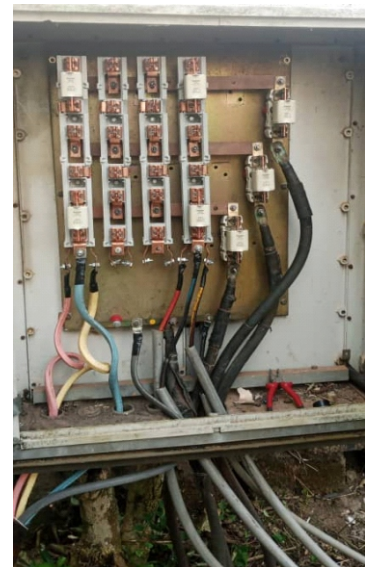
The Electricity Committee is one of the standing committees established by the Amuvi Development Group to drive electricity infrastructure development within the community. The committee is responsible for liaising with EEDC to maintain and improve electricity supply from the national grid, addressing faults in distribution systems, identifying areas requiring new transformer installations, and facilitating procurement where necessary. **The committee is made up of the following members: Mazi Engr. Onyeka Uwah (Chairman), Mazi (Dr) Cyril Orji, Mazi (Engr.) Dennis Ume Igboko, Mazi (Engr.) Ogonnia Nwafor, Mazi (PG Emiretus) Ikechukwu Okafor, Mazi Kingsley Okereke and Mazi Chris Okugo.**

At the start of 2025, the community had four operational transformers—three rated at 300KVA and one at 500KVA—while an additional 300KVA transformer remained out of service due to faults. The distribution network, including lines and feeder pillars, was largely in a state of disrepair, requiring urgent intervention.

Activities and Achievements

During the year, the committee implemented several planned activities aimed at improving electricity supply and infrastructure.

A major milestone was the successful completion and commissioning of the 500KVA, 33/0.415kV transformer at Iyiocha, which significantly enhanced power availability in the area. To support improved voltage stability and load capacity, some undersized overhead conductors connected to the substation were replaced.

The committee also rehabilitated at the cost of N908,000.00, the severely damaged feeder pillar at St. Thomas's Church junction, restoring it to full service. Routine maintenance activities were carried out, including clearing vegetation and other obstructions along distribution lines and around substations to reduce fault occurrences.

In addition, the committee undertook breakdown maintenance of lines and transformers, ensuring timely restoration of power supply whenever faults occurred. These efforts collectively contributed to a more stable and reliable electricity supply within the community.

Challenges

Despite these achievements, the committee encountered several challenges. Key among them is the need to properly ring-fence the new Iyiocha transformer to ensure it primarily serves contributing residents. There is also the ongoing issue of non-contributing beneficiaries within the Iyiocha community and bringing online few contributing members who have not being connected to the transformer due to infrastructural challenges.

Additionally, limited capacity remains a concern due to the faulty transformer at Amuvi roundabout, while growing demand for electricity continues to strain existing infrastructure. Funding constraints also affect the pace at which new projects and repairs can be executed.

Looking Ahead

Looking forward, the committee has outlined several priorities. These include extending power supply from the Iyiocha transformer to other contributors outside the immediate area, repairing the faulty transformer at Amuvi roundabout to increase available capacity, and securing an additional transformer for installation at Azuoze.

The committee also plans to strengthen security at transformer substations through the installation of solar-powered surveillance cameras. Continued collaboration with EEDC and community stakeholders will remain essential to achieving these goals.

Conclusion

In conclusion, the Electricity Committee made meaningful progress in 2025 despite existing challenges. With continued support and strategic investments, the committee is well-positioned to further improve electricity access and reliability across Amuvi.

Finance Committee

Overview

The Finance Committee is responsible for securing the financial resources required to support ADG's strategic objectives and approved development projects. Its mandate includes developing and

implementing effective fundraising strategies, fostering partnerships with donors, sponsors, and development organizations, and promoting sound financial practices that contribute to the long-term sustainability and success of ADG's mission. **The finance committee is made up of the following members: Mazi Achinivu Okorafor (Chairman), Mazi Obinna Aniche and Mazi Chima Onwunna.**

Activities and Achievements

Although fundraising activities were limited during 2025, the Finance Committee remained committed to identifying innovative opportunities for attracting external funding and strengthening the financial foundation of community development initiatives.

A major achievement during the year was the initiation and successful coordination of the development of the official AWADA website, **amuvi-arochukwu.gov**. The website serves as a comprehensive digital platform that presents the history of Amuvi, its governance structure, the constitutional evolution of AWADA, and the organizational framework of its governing institutions. It also highlights the role of ADG as the principal development arm of AWADA.

Beyond providing institutional information, the website incorporates several interactive features designed to promote community engagement, cultural preservation, and public awareness. These include a **Folklore** section that enables visitors to listen to traditional Aro folktales; a **Gallery and Events** section showcasing community activities and announcing upcoming events; a **Plan Your Trip** section offering travel guidance and accommodation information for visitors; and a **Resources** section containing valuable reference materials and community documents.

The website represents a significant step toward enhancing the community's digital presence and creating a platform that can support future fundraising, stakeholder engagement, and development initiatives.

Looking Ahead

The Committee will continue to explore innovative and sustainable approaches for attracting external funding to support ADG's development agenda. In the short term, priority will be placed on fully establishing the AWADA website as the central digital hub for community engagement, information sharing, cultural preservation, and resource mobilization.

As the platform continues to evolve, it is expected to strengthen connections with the global Amuvi community and the wider public, increase visibility for community development efforts, attract potential donors and development partners, and generate broader support for ADG projects and other strategic initiatives.

Health Committee

Overview

For many years, Arochukwu faced serious healthcare challenges, with residents traveling long distances to access medical care due to limited local infrastructure and support. However, recent efforts, particularly by the Abia State Government under the leadership of Dr. Alex Otti, have begun to change this narrative.

At the start of 2025, the committee was tasked with improving services at the Amuvi Health Clinic, strengthening eye care delivery, and introducing additional services such as dental care. **The health committee is made up of the following members: Mazi (Dr.) Sunny L. Okoroji, (Chairman), Adamazi Stella Uzumma Okoro, Adamazi (Dr.) Catherine Chima-Okereke, Adamazi (Dr.)**

Ogonnaya Kanu, Mazi (Engr.) Ogonnia Nwafor (PG), Adamazi (Dr.) Nkechi Nwafor, Mazi Ikechukwu Okafor (PG Emeritu), Mazi (Barr.) Walter Nkem Okereke and Mazi Obinna Igwe.

Activities

During the period under review, the committee undertook several key activities. These included the commissioning of a solar power system in August 2025, followed by the procurement of eye care equipment and the commissioning of the Eye Clinic in September 2025.

A fundraising campaign in September 2025 generated approximately ₦14 million to support ongoing projects. The committee also conducted house-to-house medical outreach programs and bi-monthly Arochukwu-wide outreaches covering medical, dental, and optometry services.

In addition, a Dental Clinic was established and equipped with modern facilities. Healthcare delivery was further strengthened through the engagement of part-time professionals, including optometrists, a dentist, a pharmacist, and healthcare assistants.

Infrastructure improvements were carried out across the clinic, including roofing, plumbing, electrical works, and environmental sanitation. Solar-powered streetlights were installed within the premises, while access roads and surroundings were regularly maintained. Other interventions included the repair of the clinic signpost and restoration of a damaged water pump at the primary school.

Achievements

The committee recorded several significant achievements. The Amuvi Health Clinic became the only facility in Arochukwu selected for an NGO-sponsored solar installation, greatly improving power supply and service delivery.

The establishment of the Eye Clinic marked a major milestone, providing the only dedicated eye care service in Arochukwu and surrounding communities. Patient turnout increased substantially, with over 850 patients attended-to by the end of 2025, over 360 additional patients seen between January and March 2026, more than 980 eye care patients treated since inception, and over 96 dental patients served. The donation of 635 eyeglass frames by Dr. Onwukwe's Foundation significantly reduced costs for patients. Weekly outreach programs also expanded access to basic healthcare services, including blood pressure and sugar checks, temperature monitoring, and general assessments, all provided free of charge.

Challenges

At the beginning of 2025, the committee faced several challenges, including limited availability of medical personnel, the departure of a pharmacist, poor staff performance, and declining patient confidence. These issues were addressed through the appointment of a clinic manager, which improved staff accountability, strengthened operations, and restored patient trust.

Despite these improvements, funding constraints and the need for additional medical equipment—such as a desktop chemical analyzer—remain ongoing challenges.

Looking Ahead

Looking ahead, the committee is focused on increasing patient attendance, expanding outreach programs, and improving diagnostic and treatment capabilities. Special attention will also be given to enhancing maternal and child healthcare services.

Efforts are underway to acquire critical diagnostic equipment and sustain ongoing improvements through continued collaboration with the government and stakeholders. The committee has also begun supporting complicated deliveries to help reduce infant mortality.

Sustaining this progress will require consistent community engagement and financial support. The committee therefore calls on all stakeholders and donors to remain committed to this important initiative.

Conclusion

In conclusion, the progress achieved over the past year reflects strong collaboration, community commitment, and effective leadership. The Amuvi Health Clinic has evolved into a comprehensive healthcare facility offering medical, dental, eye care, and maternal health services to other communities in Arochukwu.

Together, we must continue to strengthen and sustain both the Amuvi Health Clinic and the All Aro USA Health Care Clinic for the benefit of present and future generations.

Water Committee

Overview

The Water Committee is a sub-committee of the Amuvi Development Group (ADG), established to support AWADA in advancing infrastructural development within the Amuvi community. **The committee is made up of the following members: Mazi Augustine Kanu (Chairman); Mazi Oliver**

Illo; Mazi (Engr) Ogbonnia Nwafor, President General (PG) AWADA; Mazi (Engr) Dennis Ume Igboko, (Chairman ADG); and Mazi Achinivu Okoroafor.

The primary responsibility is to provide guidance on the effective utilization of the water facility provided by NDDC to the Amuvi community. Central to this mandate is the design of a comprehensive water reticulation system that, when implemented, will ensure water distribution to homes through major pipelines along the principal streets of Amuvi.

Activities & Achievements

During the year under review, the committee recorded several key accomplishments. We successfully traversed the entire community, carrying out measurements and designing the main reticulation lines for the project. These designs were integrated and validated using Google Maps to ensure accuracy and feasibility. In addition, we developed a reticulation template map to guide drafting and support the preparation of the final report.

The committee also worked closely with Mazi Kingsley Okereke, a major donor, on the concrete flooring of the water tank facility. This involved redesigning the plumbing and overflow lines prior to the laying of the concrete. We collaborated with the President General (PG) and the donor in reviewing the contract and provided guidance to ensure proper execution. Furthermore, we actively participated in monitoring the contract work during the flooring process.

In terms of maintenance, the committee supervised the refurbishment of the three borehole wellheads, including addressing tank and pipeline leakages. A notable example is the rehabilitation of Borehole 1, where the wellhead was refurbished and coated with anti-rust paint.

We also identified and supervised several other maintenance needs at the facility. These included minimal repairs to the security house roof, the main entrance gate, and multiple leakages within the water tanks and piping system. To enhance security and protect the facility, the committee provided and installed a signpost warning against unauthorized access and installed anti-lock system to prevent unauthorized access to water supply from the water plant.

Challenges

Despite these achievements, the committee faced a significant challenge, which is funding. Much of the maintenance work and progress on the reticulation plan have been financed through personal contributions from committee members. We are particularly grateful to Mazi Kingsley Okereke for his major financial support in completing the facility flooring. However, it is important to emphasize that AWADA, as the primary body responsible for the facility, should establish a dedicated maintenance fund. The committee's role remains supportive and advisory.

Looking ahead, the committee's focus is on completing the water reticulation plan template, which is already at an advanced stage. This will include final technical drawings and a comprehensive report to guide implementation.

Conclusion

In conclusion, the Water Committee remains committed to supporting sustainable water infrastructure development in Amuvi and ensuring that the community fully benefits from the existing water facilities.

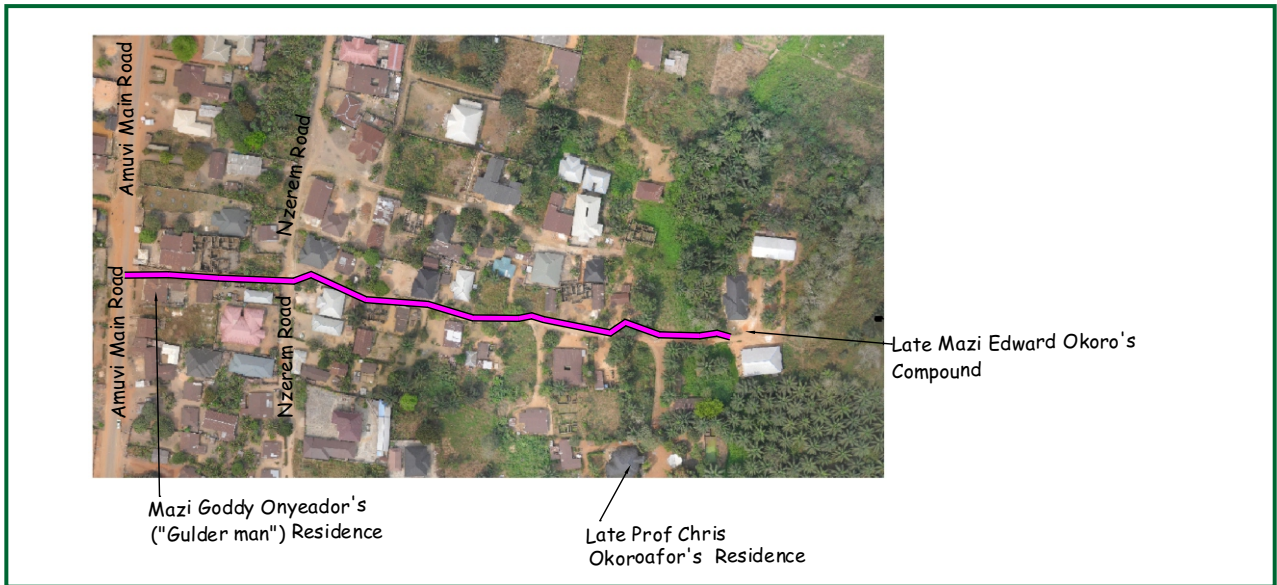

Urban Development Committee

Overview

The Amuvi Urban Development Committee (AUDC) is charged with the responsibility of providing strategic guidance, oversight, and coordination for urban development initiatives within Amuvi community. The Committee's mandate includes promoting orderly and sustainable physical development, while ensuring that growth within the community aligns with broader development goals and applicable regulatory frameworks. **The committee is made up of the following members: NyeMazi (Prof) Ifunanya Immaculate Nwokoro (Chairwoman); Mazi Egonu Ezuma; Mazi (Arch.) Charles Ijeomah; Mazi (Dr.) Goddy Okereke and Mazi (Arc) Emeka Ngwu.**

In pursuit of this mandate, AUDC is committed to addressing the challenges of unplanned and disorderly development in Amuvi. A major aspect of the Committee's long-term vision is the development of a comprehensive Digital Masterplan for Amuvi, which will serve as a blueprint for sustainable urban growth and infrastructure planning.

Activities

During the year under review, AUDC actively participated in all monthly meetings of the ADG Management Team (ADGMT), attending no fewer than eleven (11) meetings. In addition, the Committee held over twenty (20) internal meetings to deliberate on issues arising from ADG meetings and to coordinate its activities and engagements with other committees.

The Committee also participated in collaborative engagements, including tripartite meetings involving the Agriculture and Food Security Committee, as well as the Education and Training Committee.

Key activities undertaken by AUDC in 2025 included the following:

- Provision of oversight functions on ongoing road construction works within Amuvi.
- Conducting site selection and suitability analysis for proposed projects, including the Skill Acquisition Centre and Oil Mill projects.
- Presentation of a Zoom session titled “Strides Toward a Digital Masterplan for Amuvi” on June 14, 2025.
- At the instance of the AWADA President, Engr. Ogonnia Nwafor, the Committee carried out a reconnaissance survey on a proposed road project sponsored by a prospective donor. The proposed road begins from the main road near the residence of Mazi Goddy Onyeador (“Gulderman”) and terminates at the compound of Late Mazi Edward Okoro.
- Sensitization and awareness campaigns were carried out among various AWADA branches, including Umuahia AWADA, Amuvi AWADA (Home Branch), and Enugu AWADA. Efforts are underway to expand the campaigns to include Abuja, Lagos, Owerri and Port Harcourt AWADA Branches.

3.0 Achievement

Following the Zoom presentation on the Digital Masterplan initiative, the Committee published a “Questions and Answers (Q&A)” document in July 2025 to address issues and concerns raised during the presentation. In addition, excerpts from the Abia State Town Planning and Development Control Regulations relating to Building Regulations were also published to create awareness among Amuvi people on the importance of compliance with approved development standards.

Furthermore, the Committee successfully mobilized financial support for the Digital Masterplan project. Following the presentation, a total sum of ₦3,601,812 was raised through donations from well-meaning individuals and stakeholders in support of the initiative. Out of this amount, the sum of ₦3,600,000 was subsequently disbursed to AUDC by ADG for the execution of the Masterplan project.

Looking Ahead

Looking ahead, the Committee remains committed to completing the Digital Masterplan initiative, which will undoubtedly position Amuvi for greater integration into the digital and modern development landscape.

Financial Report

The table below presents the provisional financial position of the Amuvi Development Group (ADG) and its committee accounts as at 31 December 2025.

ADG commenced the 2025 financial year with an opening cash balance of ₦3,612,420.62. During the year, the Association recorded total inflows of ₦23,282,951.59, excluding interest income, while interest earned on bank deposits amounted to ₦646,840.73. Total operational expenditure for the year stood at ₦8,842,000.00. In addition, bank charges, VAT, stamp duties, and other statutory deductions amounted to ₦69,738.63.

After accounting for all inflows and expenditure, the Association closed the financial year with a cash balance of ₦18,630,474.31 (in Union Bank), ₦168,621.63 (in FCMB) and a foreign currency balance of USD 997.78.

Conclusion

In this report, we have presented the activities, achievements, challenges, and future plans for ADG and specifically of the various committees of the Amuvi Development Group (ADG). As an organization, we remain committed to focusing on initiatives and programs that deliver the greatest value and impact for the Amuvi community. We will continue to explore innovative and sustainable approaches to funding and executing our developmental projects.

In the areas of Agriculture and Food Security, we will build on improving agricultural productivity and sustained advocacy efforts to promote food security awareness and tree beautification program; and in Education and Training committees, the focus will be on consolidating the progress made during the year while developing sustainable frameworks for education, skills acquisition, entrepreneurship, and the Community Self-Built Sustainable Connectivity Hub project. Efforts will also continue toward strengthening training programs and expanding opportunities for youth empowerment and economic development.

In the Electricity sector, priority attention will be given to expanding electricity supply to residents of Ijiocha and surrounding areas, repairing faulty infrastructure at the roundabout (Agbatauzo) location, securing an additional transformer for Azuoze, and installing solar-powered security cameras to monitor distribution substations and reduce vandalism.

For the Finance Committee, the effort will be on fully developing the website and seeking external funding for community projects.

For the Health Committee, the focus will continue to be on increasing patient attendance, expanding healthcare outreach programs, and improving diagnostic and treatment capabilities in the medical, eye and dental areas. Special attention will also be directed toward enhancing maternal and child healthcare services within the community.

Within the Water Committee, emphasis will remain on completing the water reticulation template and implementation plan to facilitate effective water distribution throughout the community.

Similarly, the Urban Development Committee will continue its efforts toward the digital mapping of Amuvi lands and infrastructure through the proposed Digital Masterplan Project, which remains a critical component of the community's long-term development strategy.

There is no doubt that 2025 was another successful and productive year for ADG and the entire AWADA community. We commend and appreciate all members, stakeholders, donors, and volunteers whose dedication, sacrifices, and support contributed to these achievements.

We hope that AWADA leadership will review and circulate this report to all AWADA branches and citizens and, more importantly, carefully evaluate the challenges identified and the plans outlined for the continued development of Amuvi community.

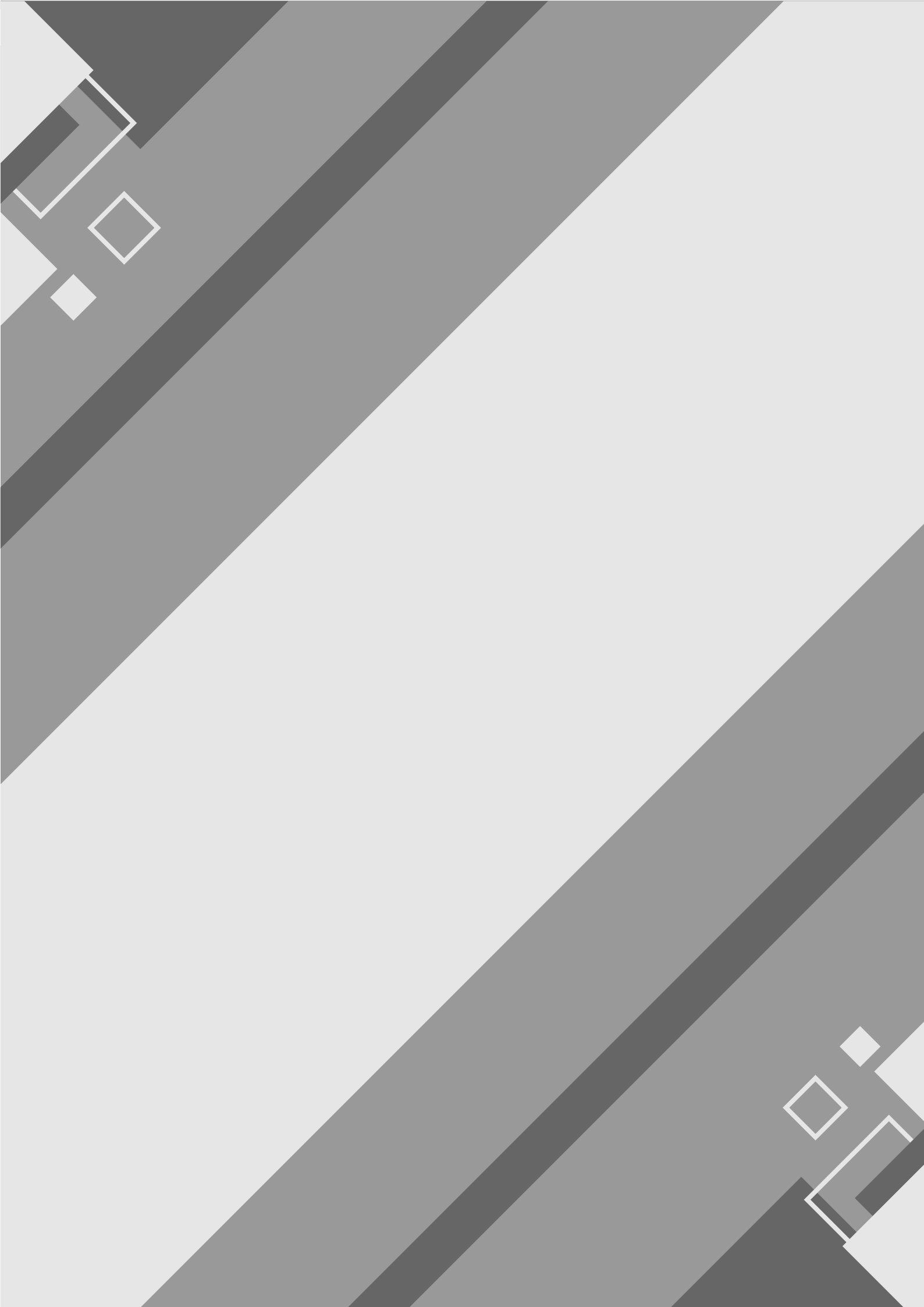
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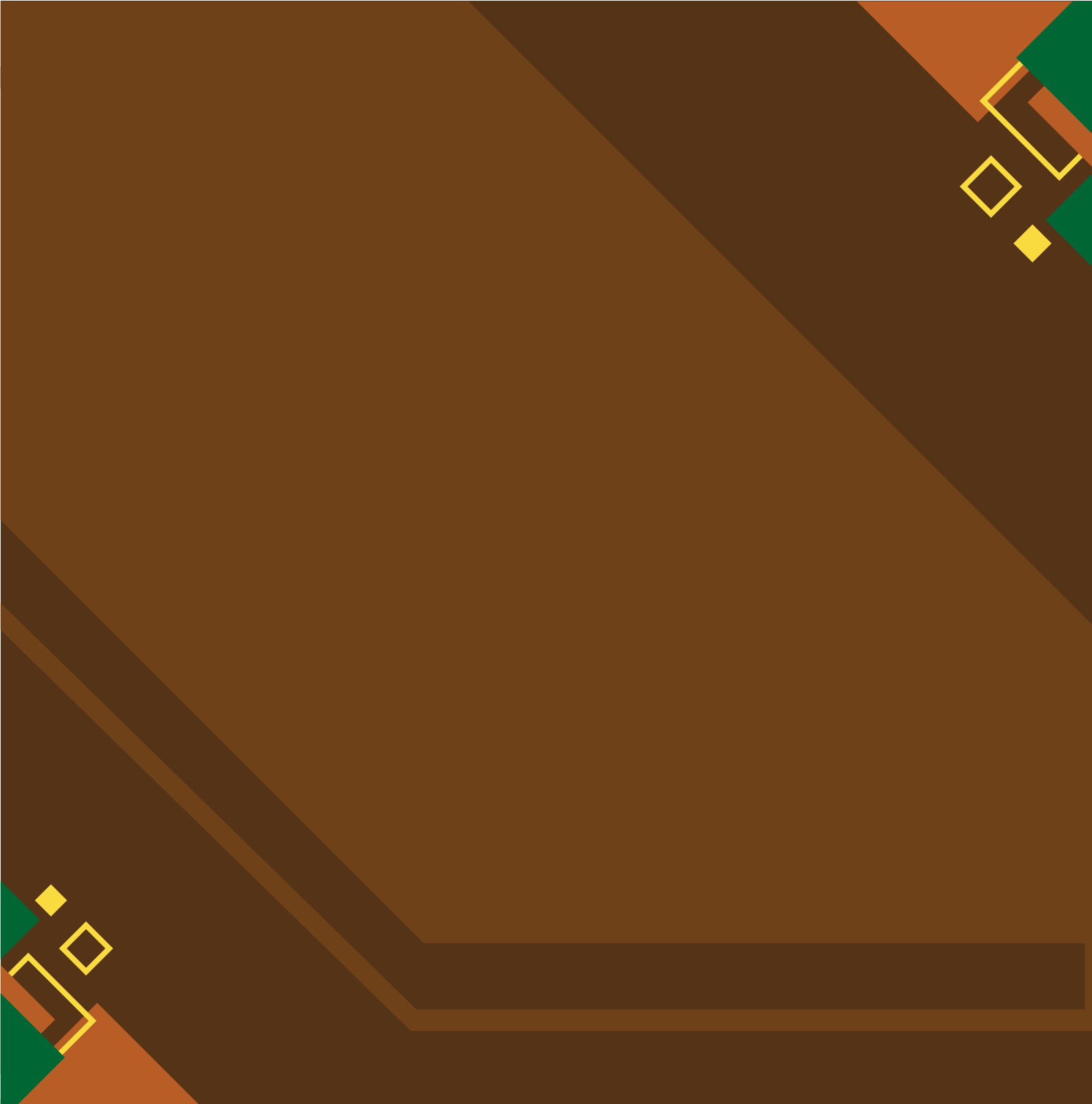
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
